Tools for Digital Music Notation and Composition

"Across the nation, school districts have significantly invested in bringing technology into the classroom. However, even in 1:1 initiatives to provide students with tablet or laptop devices, there can be a wide range of devices found in music classrooms. What may work in one setting may not in another. Music teachers may encounter difficulties in finding tools that can work with the platform and/or device adopted by their schools. Conversely, in schools with bring your own device policies, it can be difficult to find tools that work across a range of devices and platforms. This session will address current software available to assist students in composing and notating music. Drawing from teaching experiences in both ensemble and general music class settings, the presenter will discuss software options available for both computer and tablet devices. The presenter will discuss the music notation programs such as Finale, Sibelius, MuseScore, and Noteflight, including their compatibility for various devices and practical applications for use in the classroom. In addition to traditional notation programs, the presenter will also discuss programs that can be used to teach music composition through looping and audio editing software. A comparison of digital audio workstations such as GarageBand, Soundation, LMMS, and Music Maker will describe how open-sourced, browser-based, or downloadable programs may be the best fit for a particular teaching use."

KEYNOTE SPEAKER: Denese Odegaard; NAfME President



Denese Odegaard, NAfME President, is currently the Fargo (North Dakota) Public Schools Performing Arts Curriculum Specialist, and has taught orchestra for 33 years. National service includes being a board member on both the American String Teachers Association Board (ASTA) and the National Association for Music Education Board (NAfME). While on the ASTA Board, she was chair of the Committee on School Orchestra and Strings and received the ASTA Citation for Leadership twice.

Her involvement in NAfME includes being North Central President, Research Advisor for the 3-5 grade standards writing team and past member of the National-State Relations Task Force. She is currently the Executive Director of the North Dakota Music Education Association.

Odegaard authored Curriculum Writing 101: Assistance with Standards-based Music Curriculum and Assessment Writing for Band, Choir, Orchestra and General Music (GIA), co-authored the ASTA Curriculum (Alfred), and has contributed to several GIA, NAfME and Corwin publications.

She has presented curriculum and assessment sessions at international, national, and state conferences including Midwest, ASTA, TMEA, TODA, AMLE, and two Symposiums on Assessment in Music Education. Odegaard has been trained in instructional coaching through NSDC, mentoring with the New Teacher Center (CA), Backwards Design with Jay McTighe, Curriculum Mapping with Heidi Hayes Jacobs, and Seven Strategies of Assessment for Learning with Jan Chappuis.

Doerffel has presented at conferences in many states, including: Arkansas, Iowa, South Dakota, Minnesota, Wisconsin, Florida, and North Carolina on topics which range from classroom management to new teacher preparation and trombone pedagogy.

David Law



David Law is the retired 7-8th grade band director at Vernon Middle School in Marion, Iowa. He is a National Board Certified Teacher and a member of the Music Educator's National Conference, Iowa Music Educator's Conference serving as – Past President, Iowa Bandmasters Association - Past President, Northeast Iowa Bandmasters Past President, Association for School Curriculum Development, National Education Association, Iowa State Education Association, and Marion Education Association – Treasurer, and the Iowa Alliance for Arts Education – Chair. In 2004 he was selected as the Educator of the Year from Linn County and

He conducted the Augustana Band, The College & Community Concert Band, The Northlander's Jazz Ensemble, the Jazz Lab Band, and the Augustana Brass Choir. Additionally, he taught classes in brass pedagogy, music education and supervised the instrumental student teachers. Prior to his appointment at Augustana College, Dr. Schilf was on the faculty at Concordia University in St. Paul, MN. He holds the Bachelor of Music Education Degree from Concordia University, Chicago, IL, as well as the Master of Arts Degree, with an emphasis in conducting, and the Doctorate of Philosophy Degree in Music Education, both from the University of Iowa. Schilf has taught all levels of instrumental music.

Dr. Schilf 's research interests lie in intergenerational instrumental music education and in the supervision of student teachers. He has presented clinics and presentations across the United States on these very topics, including at the prestigious International Mid-West Band and Orchestra Clinic. Dr. Schilf has led ten international tours with intergenerational ensembles and has conducted these ensembles across Europe and Asia. His intergenerational research, student teaching supervision information, and music education articles have appeared in prominent national magazines and journals. During January of 2015 Schilf directed the Augustana Band on a 25 day tour of mainland China.

In November of 1992, Dr. Schilf was recognized as an Outstanding Nationally Certified teacher of music by the Music Educator's National Conference, an honor he maintains today. He is the Executive Director of the South Dakota Music Educators Association, and served the South Dakota State High School Activities Association as an All-State Band Adjudicator. His professional memberships include the National Association of Music Education (NAfME), and The College Music Society (CMS).

In April of 2016,Dr Schilf retired from Augustana University and became part-owner and manager of Popplers Music Inc. of Sioux Falls and Grand Forks, ND. This new business venture allows for him to remain active in music education in a different capacity, offering assistance to

parents and directors in the music merchandising market.

Dr. Jon Harney



Jon Harney, associate professor of music, received his Bachelor of Music degree in music education from Luther College, Decorah, Iowa, where he studied under Weston Noble, and Masters and Doctor of Musical Arts degrees in vocal performance from the University of Minnesota where he studied with Clifton Ware. As a tenor soloist, he has sung more than twenty-five principal and supporting roles in opera, operetta, and major works with orchestra and chorus. While active with the University of Minnesota opera theater, he appeared as The Sailor in Dido and Aeneas, Fenton in Falstaff, Nemorino in The Elixir of Love, Ferrando in Cosi Fan tutte and Junki in the US premier of Rautavaara's Aleksis Kivi. Other roles in the midwest included Dr. Caius in Falstaff and Basilio in Le Nozze di Figaro with the Pine Mountain Music Festival, Fenton in The Merry Wives of Windsor with the Dorian Opera Theatre and Frederick in a touring production of The Pirates of Penzance with the Madison-based Opera for the Young. He earned an honorable mention award in the 1998 Minnesota District Metropolitan Opera Auditions. Performances in Montana have included the roles of Edmondo in Manon Lescaut and Remendado in Carmen with the Intermountain Opera as well as Bach's Magnificat and Handel's Messiah with the Bozeman Symphony, Mozart's Vespers with the Butte Symphony and Mozart's Requiem with the Great Falls Symphony.

Harney has served as chorus master for the Intermountain Opera since 2002, preparing the choruses for productions of L'elisir d'amore, Aida, Lucia di Lammermoor, Cavalleria Rusticana, I Pagliacci, The Pirates of Penzance, Manon Lescaut, The Magic Flute, Carmen, La Boheme and The Ballad of Baby Doe, II Trovatore, II Barbiere di Siviglia, Madama Butterfly, Roméo et Juliette, La Traviata, La Cenerentola, HMS Pinafore and Suor Angelica

Prior to coming to MSU-Bozeman, Harney was on the voice faculty of Macalester College and directed high school choirs in the North St. Paul school district. In 2001, Dr. Harney joined the MSU-Bozeman music faculty where he teaches studio voice lessons, opera scenes class and directs the University Chorus. In 2002, he was selected as one of twelve voice teachers nationwide to participate in the National Association of Teachers of Singing Intern Program working under master teacher Elaine Bonazzi. He served as president of the Montana Chapter of the National Association of Teachers of Singing from 2007-2009. In summer 2008, Harney was selected to sing in the Westminster Choir College Chamber Choir in residence in Florence,

Italy, singing under the direction of Joe Miller and in July 2010 sang under the direction of Dale Warland as part of the Festival Chorale at the Minnesota Beethoven Festival. In 2011, Dr. Harney assumed the post of chorus director of the Bozeman Symphonic Choir.

His singers have gone on to several graduate voice programs including the Jacobs School of Music at Indiana University, the Manhattan School of Music and the University of Oregon and have been involved in summer opera programs including Oberlin in Italy, the University of Miami Frost School of Music in Salzburg program and the Johanna Meier Opera Institute.

Dr. Harney continues to be active as a vocal and choral adjudicator and master class clinician.

Augustana University Band



Under the direction of Dr. Christopher Unger, The Augustana Band makes its home at Augustana University in Sioux Falls, SD. The group has appeared before state, regional and national music educators' conferences and gatherings. The Augustana Band hosts the annual "Augustana Band Festival" and presents concerts throughout the season at the Washington Pavilion.

The Augustana Band has a rich touring tradition which has given students the opportunity to play on stages around the globe. The first international tour for the Band was a 24-day tour of Asia in January of 1999. A second tour, this time to China, occurred in 2003 and, in 2007, the Band returned once more to China and performed to sold-out audiences in China's most significant concert and music halls. The Band explored the culture and history of Egypt while on a <u>22-day tour</u> in January of 2011, and returned to China in January of 2015.

The origin of wind band music at Augustana University <u>dates back to 1896</u>, when a few students at the <u>Lutheran Normal School</u> in Sioux Falls gathered for the purpose of organizing a band.

The merger of the Lutheran Normal School and Augustana College in 1918 strengthened the band in quality and number. A constitution was approved stating "the purpose of this organization shall be to create interest in band music, to furnish an opportunity for instruction on the various instruments, and to provide a means of entertainment."

Dr. Christopher Unger



Dr. Christopher Unger is the 5th conductor of the Augustana Band. He began his tenure at the University in September of 2015.

Unger served as the Interim Director of Bands at the University of British Columbia. Prior to that appointment., Dr. Unger served as the Assistant Conductor of both the Eastman Wind Orchestra and the Eastman Wind Ensemble. At Eastman, Dr. Unger was honoured with the Frederick Fennell Fellowship for Advanced Conducting Study, the Evan Whallon Conducting Award, and the prestigious Walter Hagen Conducting Prize. His role at Eastman provided him with the opportunity to act as a producer on the Eastman Wind Ensemble's 2013 release on Avie Records titled Stravinsky-Octet/L'Histoire du Soldat. In addition to conducting the wind ensembles, Dr. Unger worked with the Brass Guild, the Trumpet Ensemble, and the Graduate Chamber Orchestra. He also was chosen to conduct a featured performance of Imis, by Massimo Luaricella, the 2011/2012 OSSIA International Composition Competition winner, with the Ossia New Music Ensemble.

Prior to his graduate studies, Dr. Unger was the Instrumental Music Teacher at G.P. Vanier Secondary School in Courtenay, British Columbia. Under his baton, the instrumental ensembles at Vanier participated in regional and national festivals and received national recognition for their performances at Musicfest Canada. In his final year at Vanier, Dr. Unger was nominated for the CARAS/MUSICAN teacher of the year award.

Dr. Unger won the American Prize in Conducting in the Wind Ensemble Division in 2013. The American Prize is a series of new, non-profit national competitions in the performing arts, unique in scope and structure, providing awards, professional adjudication, and regional, national, and international recognition. Each year, The American Prize rewards the best recorded performances by individual artists and ensembles in the United States.

Dr. Unger's principal conducting teachers were Dr. Mark Scatterday and Dr. Colleen Richardson. He has attended a number of influential conducting symposiums where he worked with master wind conductors such as Donald Hunsberger, Frank Battisti, Charles Peltz, Michael Haithcock, Allan McMurray, Craig Kirchhoff, Michael Votta, Gary Hill, and Rodney Winther. He maintains professional affiliations with the College Band Directors National Association, the World Association of Symphonic Bands and Ensembles, and the Conductor's Guild.

Dr. Unger received his D.M.A in conducting from the Eastman School of Music in 2013. Additionally, he holds degrees from the University of Western Ontario and the University of British Columbia.

Brandon Valley Wind Ensemble



The Brandon Valley High School Wind Ensemble has a long history of musical excellence. The Wind Ensemble is the top performing ensemble within the Brandon Valley band program. The BVHS Band department focuses on providing a well rounded musical education for all of its students. Other performing at BVHS include: Symphonic Band, Concert Band, 3 jazz bands, 2 pep bands, small ensembles, solos, and the 150 member competitive marching band, The Marching Lynx. The BVHS Wind Ensemble focuses on playing the best of elite high school and college literature and rehearses on a daily basis. The 50 students that make up this ensemble take part in many All-State events as well as regional and national honor ensembles. The group is under the direction of Mr. Chris Borchardt. Mr. Borchardt is in his third year at Brandon Valley and his sixth year of teaching overall. He completed his undergraduate degree at Augustana University and has a Masters degree in Music Education from Northern State University. He and his wife Kayla have a two year old son, Connor.
